Lesson 4: English Question Formation

Question formation in English is different from the formation of other sentences in two main ways. Instead of beginning with the subject, **questions begin with a helping verb**, such as to do, to be, to have, Should, would...

Types of Questions:

English has two types of questions: 'Wh-' Question and 'Yes/ No' Question.

1/ 'Wh-' Question:

When we are asking for information we begin a question with a 'Wh-' question word. Question words include who, what, when, where, why, how, whom, which, how many, how much, how long)

2/ 'Yes/ No' Question:

When we just need a yes or no answer, we omit the question word and begin directly with the helping verb.
