Lesson five: Plagiarism

Plagiarism is an act of intellectual dishonesty and an unethical behaviour in the academic field. It violates honour codes and may cause an irreparable damage to one's reputation and career. A plagiarized assignment may lead to a failing grade, a suspension or an expulsion. The act of plagiarism may be intentional, reckless or unintentional.

Forms of Plagiarism

	e- The act of copying sections of another author word by word without quoting or
	attribution.
	f- The use of one's own previously published work or significant parts of it without
	attribution.
	g- The use of someone else's writing with some minor changes in the sentences.
	h- Misleading attribution of the work when an individual contributes to a work
	without getting credit for it or when an individual get a credit without contributing
	to the work.
	i- The act of interlaying someone else's phrases or text within one's own writing.

Tips to avoid plagiarism

- \checkmark Take time reading sources and understanding them. Start as early as possible.
- \checkmark Make your own outline. Do not follow the outline of the sources.
- ✓ Avoid using unique words from other people's work and especially avoid using their string of words.
- ✓ Avoid using the same structure and organization of ideas found in other people's work. Restate a source in the order that reflects your thoughts about their ideas and use your own tone.
- ✓ Paraphrase without looking at the original text. Write your ideas as though you are explaining things to a friend.
- \checkmark Keep track of your sources.
- \checkmark Use plagiarism detector.
