Introduction



1.2 ICT Tools






1.3.1 Communications spaces


There are three main types of communication spaces: Internet, Extranet, and Intranet.




• Internet: The internet is a global network that connects millions of computers and other devices worldwide. It allows for communication, sharing of information, and access to resources through various services such as email, websites, social media, and more. The internet is public and accessible to anyone with an internet connection.



• Extranet: An extranet is an extension of an intranet that allows limited access to authorized external users such as suppliers, partners, or customers. It provides a secure platform for collaboration and communication between the organization and its external stakeholders. Extranets typically require authentication for access and may offer functionalities such as shared project spaces, document sharing, and communication tools tailored to external partners.



• Intranet: is a private network that is confined within an organization. It enables internal communication, collaboration, and sharing of resources among employees or members of the organization. Intranets are often used to disseminate company news, documents, policies, and other information securely within the organization's boundaries.



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1.3.2 Databases

Databases in ICT refer to structured collections of data that enable quick searching, sorting, filtering, and analysis. They can have various structures like flat files or relational databases, employing relationships, primary keys.

A database application can be used for storing or retrieving data, processing transactions, or various machine learning calculations. There are many types of database, such as:

Relational Databases: These are the most common type, organizing data into tables with rows and columns, and using SQL (Structured Query Language) for querying and manipulation. Examples include MySQL.

Hierarchical Databases: the hierarchical database looks similar to a family tree. A single object (the "parent") has one or more objects beneath it (the "child"). No child can have more than one parent.

Non-Relational Databases: Non-relational management systems are commonly referred to as NoSQL databases. This type of database matured due to increasingly complex modern web applications. Examples include MongoDB and Redis.

Object oriented databases: Object oriented databases are unique because associations between objects can persist. This means that object oriented programming and the querying of data across complex relationships is fast and powerful. One example of an object oriented database is MongoDB.

All types of databases store vast amounts of structured or unstructured data. It allow for the manipulation and modification of stored data, and implementing access controls and encryption to protect sensitive information with ensuring data remains accurate, consistent, and reliable.. In addition, users can efficiently retrieve specific information using queries.


1.3.3 Multimedia

The term "multimedia" is used here to refer to the extensive use of images, photographs, sound and video files, as well as text. In other words, we are concerned here with a variety of formats in which we can access, understand, process and express knowledge

- 1. Audioconferencing: Audio conferencing is where two or more people in different locations use technology like a conference bridge to hold an audio call. Audio conferencing is different from a traditional phone in that all participants dial into a central system that connects them instead of directly dialing each other.
- 2. Videoconferencing: Video conferencing is live, visual connection between two or more remote parties over the internet that simulates a face-to-face meeting. It is an online technology that allows users in different locations to hold face-to-face meetings without having to move to a single location together. Videoconferencing tools allow users to conduct meetings, discussions, or presentations remotely via voice communication. Here are some popular audio conferencing tools: Zoom, Microsoft Teams, Cisco Webex, GoToMeeting, Google Meet, and Skype,

1.3.4 Electronic data interchange (EDI)

Electronic Data Interchange (EDI) is a standardized method for exchanging business documents electronically between trading partners. It allows companies to transfer documents such as purchase orders, invoices, shipping notices, and more, in a structured format, directly from one computer system to another, without the need for human intervention. There are some popular EDI software solutions: IBM Sterling B2B Integrator, MuleSoft Anypoint Platform, SAP S/4HANA and TrueCommerce.




When selecting EDI software, businesses should consider factors such as scalability, compatibility with existing systems, ease of use, security features, and compliance with industry standards.

1.3.5 Workflows

The sequence of tasks, processes, or actions that need to be executed to achieve a particular goal or outcome within an organization or system. They are commonly used in various fields such as business, technology, project management, and manufacturing to streamline operations, improve efficiency, and ensure consistency in the way work is carried out.

- 8. **Integration:** Different components or outputs of the workflow are integrated or consolidated to create a cohesive result or deliverable.
- 9. **Documentation:** Documentation of the workflow steps, decisions, and outcomes is essential for future reference, analysis, and improvement. This step involves recording important information and insights gathered throughout the process.
- 10. Closure: The final step involves formally closing the workflow once all tasks have been completed, deliverables have been produced, and objectives have been achieved. Lessons learned are often documented during this stage for future improvement.

- Healthcare: The Internet has applications in healthcare, including telemedicine, remote patient monitoring, health information exchange, and online medical consultations. It enhances access to healthcare services, improves patient outcomes, and supports medical research and education

2.1.3 Terminologies

The Internet is a vast network of interconnected computers and devices that communicate with each other using standardized protocols and technologies. There are some common terminologies associated with the Internet:

- URL (Uniform Resource Locator): A URL is a web address that specifies the location of a resource on the Internet. It typically consists of a protocol (e.g., http:// or https://), domain name (e.g., www.example.com), and optional path to the specific resource.
- HTTP (Hypertext Transfer Protocol): HTTP is the protocol used for transmitting and receiving web pages and other resources on the World Wide Web. It defines how web browsers and web servers communicate with each other.
- HTML (Hypertext Markup Language): HTML is the standard markup language used to create and structure web pages. It defines the structure and layout of web content using tags and attributes.
- IP Address (Internet Protocol Address): An IP address is a unique numerical identifier assigned to each device connected to a net-

work. It enables devices to communicate with each other over the Internet.

- DNS (Domain Name System): DNS is a decentralized naming system that translates domain names (e.g., www.example.com) into IP addresses. It allows users to access websites using human-readable domain names instead of numerical IP addresses.
- ISP (Internet Service Provider): An ISP is a company that provides access to the Internet to individuals and organizations. ISPs typically offer various types of Internet connectivity, including dial-up, broadband, and wireless connections.
- Router: A router is a networking device that forwards data packets between computer networks. It acts as a gateway between a local network (e.g., home or office network) and the Internet, enabling devices to connect to the Internet.
- Modem (Modulator-Demodulator): A modem is a device that modulates and demodulates digital data to enable communication over a telephone line, cable network, or other communication channels. It converts digital signals from a computer into analog signals for transmission and vice versa.
- Firewall: A firewall is a network security device that monitors and controls incoming and outgoing network traffic based on predetermined security rules. It helps protect a network from unauthorized access, malware, and other cyber threats.
- VPN (Virtual Private Network): A VPN is a secure network connection that allows users to access the Internet privately and securely. It encrypts data transmitted between the user's device and the VPN server, protecting it from eavesdropping and interception.

- Cookie: A cookie is a small piece of data stored on a user's device by a website. It is used to remember user preferences, login information, and other browsing activities, enabling personalized web experiences.
- TCP/IP (Transmission Control Protocol/Internet Protocol): TCP/IP is the suite of protocols used for transmitting data over the Internet. It defines how data is packaged, addressed, transmitted, routed, and received between devices on a network.
- Bandwidth: Bandwidth refers to the maximum rate at which data can be transmitted over a network connection. It is typically measured in bits per second (bps), kilobits per second (kbps), megabits per second (Mbps), or gigabits per second (Gbps).
- Latency: Latency, also known as ping, is the time it takes for a data packet to travel from the source to the destination and back again. It is measured in milliseconds (ms) and can affect the responsiveness of network applications and services.
- Packet: A packet is a unit of data that is transmitted over a network. It consists of a header containing routing information and a payload containing the actual data being transmitted.
- Switch: A switch is a networking device that connects multiple devices within a LAN and forwards data packets between them. It operates at the data link layer of the OSI model and uses MAC addresses to identify devices on the network.
- Gateway: A gateway is a networking device that connects two different types of networks, such as a LAN and the Internet. It acts as an interface between the two networks, translating protocols and facilitating communication.
- FTP (File Transfer Protocol): FTP is a protocol used for transferring files between a client and a server on a network. It allows users to

upload, download, and manage files on remote servers, typically used for website maintenance and file sharing.

- VoIP (Voice over Internet Protocol): VoIP is a technology that allows voice communication over the Internet using IP networks. It enables users to make phone calls, video calls, and multimedia conferences over the Internet, typically at lower costs than traditional telephone services.
- Cloud Computing: Cloud computing is a technology that enables the delivery of computing services, such as storage, processing, and software applications, over the Internet. It allows users to access resources ondemand from remote data centers, providing scalability, flexibility, and cost-efficiency.

2.2.2 Directories

Directories are structured lists of websites organized by categories and subcategories. Unlike search engines, which use algorithms to crawl and index web pages based on keywords, directories rely on human editors who review and categorize websites manually. Directories are often used as a complementary tool to search engines for finding specific types of websites or resources within a particular niche:

- 1. Yahoo Directory: was one of the earliest web directories and provided categorized listings of websites. However, Yahoo discontinued its directory service in 2014.
- 2. DMOZ (Open Directory Project): DMOZ was a volunteer-edited directory that aimed to catalog the entire internet. It was one of the largest and most comprehensive directories but ceased operations in 2017.
- 3. Best of the Web (BOTW): BOTW is a curated directory that features high-quality websites across various categories, including business, arts, health, and more.
- **4. Business:** is focused on business-related websites, services, and resources. It provides listings for various industries (marketing, finance,...)
- **5. Yelp:** While primarily known for its user-generated reviews of businesses, Yelp also serves as a directory for local businesses, restaurants, and services. Users can search for businesses by category, location, and ratings.
- **6. TripAdvisor:** TripAdvisor is a popular directory for travel-related businesses, including hotels, restaurants, attractions, and tours. It offers user reviews, ratings, and recommendations for travelers worldwide.

Directories can be valuable resources for finding niche websites, local businesses, or specific types of information. However, their relevance has declined with the rise of search engines like Google.

2.2.3 Automatic indexing

Automatic indexing, also known as web crawling or web spidering, is the process by which search engines systematically browse and collect information from web pages to build their index. This index is then used to provide relevant search results to users when they enter a query. This is how automatic indexing works:

- 1. Discovery: Search engines use a process called crawling to discover new web pages. They start by identifying a set of seed URLs. From these seed URLs, the crawler follows links to other pages on the web, gradually expanding its reach to include more and more websites.
- 2. Crawling: Once the crawler reaches a web page, it parses the page's HTML code to extract text content, links, metadata, and other relevant information. The crawler follows each link on the page to visit additional pages, continuing the process recursively.
- 3. Indexing: As the crawler collects data from web pages, it organizes this information into a structured index. This index contains key information about each web page, such as its URL, title, content, and metadata. The index allows the search engine to quickly retrieve relevant pages when a user enters a search query.
- 4. Ranking: When a user submits a search query, the search engine retrieves relevant pages from its index and ranks them based on various factors, such as keyword relevance, page authority, and user engagement metrics. The most relevant pages are then displayed to the user in the search results.

Automatic indexing enables search engines to continuously update their indexes with new web pages and changes to existing pages, ensuring that search results remain fresh and relevant over time.

2.2.4 Browsers

Browsers are software applications used to access and navigate the internet. They interpret HTML code and render web pages, allowing users to view text, images, videos, and other online content. Browsers also provide features such as bookmarks, history, tabs, and extensions to enhance the browsing experience. The popular web browsers are:

- 1. Google Chrome: ⁸ Developed by Google, Chrome is one of the most widely used browsers globally. It offers fast performance, a clean interface, and seamless integration with Google services.
- 2. Mozilla Firefox: ⁹Firefox is an open-source browser known for its privacy features, customizable interface, and support for extensions. It emphasizes user control and data protection.
- 3. Microsoft Edge: ¹⁰ Edge is Microsoft's modern browser that comes pre-installed with Windows 10 and later versions. It offers fast performance, built-in security features, and integration with Microsoft services.
- **4. Apple Safari:** ¹¹ Safari is the default browser on Apple devices such as Mac computers, iPhones, and iPads. It is known for its speed, energy efficiency, and seamless integration with macOS and iOS.
- **5. Opera:**¹² Opera is a feature-rich browser that offers built-in ad blocking, VPN, and other privacy-enhancing features.
- **6. Brave:** ¹³ Brave is a privacy-focused browser that blocks ads and trackers by default, offering a faster and more secure browsing experience. It also features a built-in cryptocurrency wallet.

2.2.5 Search refinement

Typically refers to the process of improving the effectiveness and precision of online searches by using various techniques and tools. This can include refining search queries, using advanced search operators, filtering search results, and utilizing specialized search engines:

- Choice of keywords: Choosing the right keywords is essential for effective web searching:
 - 1. Be specific: Use keywords that accurately describe the information you're looking for. Avoid using broad terms that may yield too many irrelevant results. For example, instead of searching for "cars," try "electric cars" or "hybrid cars" if that's what you're interested in.
 - 2. Use synonyms: This can help you capture a broader range of relevant results. For instance, if you're searching for information about "climate change," you might also try "global warming" or "environmental crisis."
 - **3. Include key phrases:** If you're looking for information about a specific topic or concept, consider using key phrases or phrases that are commonly associated with that topic. For example, instead of searching for "diabetes," you might try "diabetes symptoms," "diabetes treatment," or "diabetes prevention."
 - **4.** Use quotation marks: If you're searching for a specific phrase or term, enclose it in quotation marks to ensure that the search engine looks for that exact phrase. This can help narrow down your results and find more relevant information.
 - **5. Exclude irrelevant terms:** Use the minus sign (-) before a word or phrase to exclude it from your search results. This can help you filter out irrelevant information and focus on what's most important to you.

- Boolean operators: Boolean operators are powerful tools for refining web searches by allowing users to combine or exclude keywords to find more precise results. Here are the three main Boolean operators and how they can be used:
 - 1. AND: The AND operator is used to narrow down search results by including multiple keywords. When you use "AND" between two keywords, the search engine will only return results that include both of those keywords. For example, searching for "cats AND dogs" will only show results that mention both cats and dogs.
 - 2. OR: The OR operator is used to broaden search results by including either of two keywords. When you use "OR" between two keywords, the search engine will return results that include either of those keywords. Banners are a common form of display advertising in internet advertising. They are graphical advertisements that appear on websites, typically in the form of rectangular images or multimedia content.


